# CHEMICAL KINETICS (16:160:534/434) FALL 2023

Welcome to chemical kinetics! Chemical kinetics is the study of how and why chemical reactions occur at different rates, exploring the factors that influence the speed of reactions and reaction pathways that occur. This course is designed to provide you with the framework to understand and study chemical reaction rates and mechanisms in any context, both experimental and theoretical, from complex biological systems to solid-state materials chemistry.

In this course, we will delve into the fundamental principles that govern the kinetics of chemical reactions, focusing on topics such as reaction orders, rate laws, reaction mechanisms, and the influence of temperature and catalysts on reaction rates. By studying chemical kinetics, you will gain the tools necessary to analyze reaction data, predict reaction outcomes, and uncover the underlying factors that shape the progress of chemical transformations.
